



Do Americans support **political violence**?

UPDATES FROM THE 2026 LIFE IN AMERICA SURVEY

Since 2022, researchers at the Centers for Violence Prevention at UC Davis have surveyed Americans on how they feel about political violence, including whether it is ever justified and, if so, whether they would personally get involved in it. This fact sheet provides updated key findings of the research and citations to peer-reviewed publications.

General support for political violence decreased.

There was a broad **decrease in support for political violence in the United States from mid-2025 to mid-2026**, contrary to expectation and popular perception.

Three-fourths (77%) of participants believed that violence "in general...to advance a political objective that you support" was never justified.

Support for political violence decreased across nearly all specific scenarios in 2026.

There were significant decreases in respondents' anticipation of, justification for, and willingness to commit political violence across almost two-thirds of survey statements detailing specific scenarios (35/53 items).

The only significant increase was in respondents' expectation of civil war.

Support remained stronger on the political right than on the political left.

Decreases occurred across the political spectrum. Justification for political violence—but not personal willingness to engage in violence—was more common among MAGA Republicans than most others.

A small but concerning group of non-Republican MAGA supporters had higher levels of support for and willingness to engage in violence than most other groups.

RELATED STUDIES FROM CVP

This is the latest in a series of studies on political violence from the Centers for Violence Prevention at UC Davis.

Its findings confirm and expand upon those of whole-population studies in 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025. Other publications have explored variation with MAGA movement and political party affiliation; focused on those who endorse intergroup fear and loathing (racism, antisemitism, Islamophobia, xenophobia, hostile sexism, homonegativity, and transphobia), firearm owners, social media users, and those who approve of the National Rifle Association; assessed views on civil war in 2023 and 2024; and measured support for authoritarianism and use of force by the federal government in 2025.
